ISAAC'S LARGEST COMMUNITY SPACE RECEIVES \$8M INJECTION

A multimillion-dollar redevelopment for one of Isaac's community centres will change the landscape in how events, education and training workshops will be delivered.

Isaac Regional Council welcomed the \$8 million funding announcement to support the Moranbah Community Centre upgrade thanks to round one of the Resources Community Infrastructure Fund in December 2021.

Mayor Anne Baker said the centre is one of the Isaac region's vital hubs which hosts up to 700 social, business and larger community gatherings since 2018.

"This is a community-led project where we have consulted with our stakeholders and we are beyond excited to see this finally come into fruition," Mayor Baker said.

"We'll now be able to redevelop and refurbish the centre, creating even better spaces for the community.

"In a six-month period, the centre attracts nearly 7,500 through industry and community events.

"Locals can look forward to a centre with a new layout, modern décor and electrical and audio-visual systems that will attract better events in addition to delivering world class education and training."

Deputy Premier and Minister for Infrastructure Steven Miles said resources communities in the Mackay-Isaac-Whitsunday region would share in Round 1 of the Queensland Government's \$100 million Resources Community Infrastructure Fund (RCIF).

"The resource sector is vital to our economy and employs around 84,000 workers, directly supporting more than 15,000 Queensland businesses," Mr Miles said.

"Despite the challenges COVID-19 has brought, our resources sector has been able to continue operating throughout the pandemic, helping support our economy."

Minister for Resources Scott Stewart said the Fund is a voluntary partnership between the Queensland Government, resource companies, and the Queensland Resources Council (QRC).

"The government has partnered with resource companies to see investments in the communities that support them," Mr Stewart said.

"These communities are critical to rebuilding Queensland's economy. And these new community infrastructure projects will create more jobs and more opportunities for regional Queenslanders.

"Not only will the 20 projects support even better facilities for their regions, they will also create more employment, creating an estimated 186 jobs for Queenslanders during construction."

Mayor Baker said she would like to acknowledge all those who have been part of the consultation process in providing feedback to the future use of the multi-purpose community asset.

"The centre is over 50 years old and these funds will assist in the significant refurbishment and upgrade," Mayor Baker said.

"Council would like to say thank you to the Queensland Government, the Queensland Resources Council and the resource companies who have invested in this critical community asset."

The funds will be directed to technological upgrades to ensure connectivity needs are met for industry and general community users into the future, as well as replacement of mechanical services, including the air-conditioning system.

The upgrade would see it better fulfil its role as Moranbah's only contemporary multi-functional community space, supporting the needs of the community, mining industry and local businesses.

The Resources Community Infrastructure Fund was established by a voluntary partnership between coal and mineral companies through the Queensland Resources Council and the Queensland Government.

The overall total of the Moranbah Community Centre redevelopment is in excess of \$10 million with Isaac Regional Council co-funding the project.

COMMUNITY RESILIENCE SHINES IN COUNCIL'S ANNUAL REPORT

Sustainable management of finite resources increasingly remains a key priority for Isaac Regional Council during unparalleled times.

Council's 2020-21 Annual Report outlines how the Isaac region is transforming from mining investment boom, to a community evolving with challenging economic and social conditions.

Mayor Anne Baker said the annual report showed the 2020-21 financial year tested the resilience of the Isaac region both economically and socially.

"Between July 2020 and June 2021, 298 events led and supported by Council have been reactivated," Mayor Baker said.

"In 2020-21, tourism, advocacy and reactivating community engagement has been a priority to helping Isaac return to a new kind of normal."

In response to the pandemic's acute social and economic impacts, Council was proactive in implementing a range of financial support measures to assist the most vulnerable sectors and individuals in the Isaac region to safeguard the local economy.

The 2020-21 capital works program, totalling \$54.9 million, saw Council maintain critical infrastructure, bolster economic activity, and support active and attractive communities across the Isaac region.

CEO Jeff Stewart-Harris said there was an increasing demand on Council support, services and resources.

"Yet there is not a corresponding increase in our rate-base to support the cost of services, nor increases in funding from the state or federal governments," Mayor Baker said.

"The financial year of 2020-21 reinforced our continued focus on

the fundamentals of good local government, delivering critical infrastructure, services and attractive communities.

"This approach reinforces our ability to continually move forward with resilience to deliver quality services to our community, and continue our aim to feed, power and build communities."

Mayor Baker said Council achieved this through a frugal budget approach, allowing Council to ease cost-of-living pressures on our residents and businesses, freezing rates and levies in 2020-21 at 2019-20 levels and implementing a broad range of concessions.

"To further stimulate the local economy and steer the region through the COVID-19 community recovery, Council increased the weighting in our procurement applications, so local companies are weighted higher than non-local businesses," Mayor Baker said.

"Council also brought forward the Shop Isaac program, endorsing local businesses through cards loaded with money and spent in our Isaac businesses.

"These initiatives complemented a \$1 million investment in the COVID-19 Strategic Recovery Plan, a two-year plan to help reactivate our Isaac communities that the pandemic impacted."

The annual report is Council's most comprehensive report to the community describing how the Council has met its annual objectives.

The central objective is to inform communities and stakeholders of Council's performance during the financial year.

BOOST PROVIDES MORE HOUSING FOR ESSENTIAL SERVICE WORKERS

Isaac region's essential service workers are set to benefit from having access to 16 new affordable housing units thanks to a \$8 million funding boost.

The Isaac Affordable Housing Trust (IAHT) board has welcomed the injection from round one of Resources Community Infrastructure Fund.

Isaac Regional Council Mayor Anne Baker, who chairs IAHT, said housing is a fundamental social need in the region.

"This funding will provide generational housing security for critical non-mine workers in our region," Mayor Baker said.

"Housing supply in resource communities is challenging, especially those who are essential service workers, such as nurses, hairdressers or check out operators.

"The new units will include five units designed to Liveable Housing Australia's gold standard for tenants supported by the National Disability Insurance Scheme."

Deputy Premier and Minister for Infrastructure Steven Miles said resources communities in the Mackay-Isaac-Whitsunday region would share in Round 1 of the Queensland Government's \$100 million Resources Community Infrastructure Fund.

"The resource sector is vital to our economy and employs around 84,000 workers, directly supporting more than 15,000 Queensland businesses," Mr Miles said.


